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Poor Martha

Jesus comes to Bethany, the home where he is always welcome and apparently made to feel at home. Martha, conscious of her duty as hostess, sets about preparing a meal. Her younger sister Mary prefers to sit and listen to whatever Jesus has to say to those who would inevitably have gathered there. And, not surprisingly, Martha is put out. "Lord, tell my sister to come and help me". But Jesus sides with Mary! "She has chosen the best part".

You could hardly blame Martha if she had promptly whipped off her apron and sat down with the others. From what he says to the disciples when they urged him to eat at the encounter with the Samaritan woman (John 4) it seems that Jesus would easily have coped with this, but one wonders how the others would have felt. Most likely Martha went back to her work, filled with resentment.

I think too, of the Prodigal's Older Brother. In this case, the younger one has taken one third of the capital out of the family concern, cleared off and left his brother to pick up the pieces. Now he comes crawling back, well aware that he deserves nothing, yet their father is so pleased to see him he goes quite over the top, kills the fatted calf and gets a party going. Meanwhile, the older brother is at work in the fields. He doesn't even know what is going on until he returns from work. They might have let him know. No mobile phones in those days, but they could have sent a servant. Understandably, he is resentful, like Martha. (The fatted calf would not have been pleased either.)

We need to remember that the account of what happened at Bethany is a story from real life, while the other is a parable, intended to alert us to our human failings. Can we sing "The vilest offender who truly believes, that moment from Jesus a pardon receives" and mean it? Is it fair? That those who have borne the heat and burden of the day should get the same recompense as the late-comers? Yet that is what infinite love means. The Pharisees knew when Jesus was thinking of them; do we?

We live in an extremely unstable world – literally and metaphorically. If we feel totally helpless, on the edge of a precipice, try to imagine how our Turkish and Syrian neighbours are feeling in their immense suffering, grieving and facing a bewildering, unknown future.

Meanwhile the suffering and exile of Ukrainians continue and in the aftermath of the floods in Pakistan (remember them?) six months ago which drove 33 million from their homes and left a third of the country submerged, 8.6 million are still facing hunger – more than the population of Scotland).

This is one more example of the poorest people facing the catastrophic impact of human behaviour and actions which have created the climate crisis, for which they bear the least responsibility. The International Rescue Committee has identified that the 20 poorest countries contribute less than 2% of global carbon dioxide emissions.

By February 13th this year the volume of sea ice surrounding Antarctica was smaller than at any time since satellite measurements began in the late 1970s. And the current summer melt still has some way to go. Last year the record melt was recorded on February 25.

Disasters are not always the result of 'natural' catastrophes caused by the climate crisis. Tragedies also arise from greed, both political (the invasion of Ukraine) and economic (cutting corners by not building to earthquake-proof standards in Syria). These events hit the headlines and our human response has seen millions raised for the victims of the Turkish and Syrian earthquake.

The other arm of Christian Aid's activity, its long-term development work, does not grab the headlines in the same way but the suffering of impoverished communities, months or even years after disasters strike or as the result of drought and conflict is equally immense and lifethreatening. Recently announced UK humanitarian aid will target malnutrition in four regions of rising insecurity in Ethiopia and in Nigeria, where poor harvests have left millions short of food.

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More volunteers needed to ring church bells for the King

The Coronation's 'Ring for the King' challenge is still urgently looking for more volunteers – several thousand more of them, in fact.

The new recruits will be needed if all the church bells in the country are to be rung on 6th May, the day of the Coronation.

As we go to press, so far the Ring for the King campaign has attracted less than 500. But there is still time, and organisers remain upbeat.

The Central Council of Church Bell Ringers (CCCBR) says that new recruits need about 15 hours of training to be able to manage a bell alone. And the CCCBR hopes that once volunteers have discovered the fun of bell-ringing, "they'll want to continue to grow their skills and friendships made through this journey of discovery."

There are 6,000 sets of bells across Britain, containing almost 38,000 bells, which require one ringer per bell. However, there are only about 30,000 bell-ringers across the country, with some teams working across several churches.

Anyone aged eight and over can get involved in bell-ringing. It has been described as "gentle exercise" and does not require a certain level of fitness, although ringers often have to climb a church's spiral staircase to get to its belfry.
